













120 children were supported with remedial classes and homework support four days a week, combined with psychosocial and recreational activities once per week.

The 120 children also recieved healthy snacks five days a week.





The project aims to reduce negative coping mechanisms and mitigate critical child protection risks, such as child labour, child marriage and the use of violent discipline.





This will be ensured through increasing the availability of sufficient water supplies of quality to target vulnerable communities through the construction of a sustainable water resource (a 500 cubic meter water reservoir) to benefit about 5,800 households in the targeted area.





Refugee and host communities in Baalbek, Lebanon have secure access to improved WASH services with the aim to reduce morbidity and mortality, as well as to improve the protection and quality of life.

Additionally, In order to improve water management practices, including sustainable water management and ensuring self-reliance of the population in water and sanitation. The ADRA Bekaa team conducted water-management and sanitation activities awareness session for 118 individuals to increase the responsible behavior and practice of community members in water consumption and hygiene practices.



Access to water for Lebanese communities with a high number of Syrian refugees
Supported by Czech Republic Humanitarian Aid

This project aimed at addressing gaps in the WASH sector in Bekaa Valley, namely lack of quality water supply and hygiene items are increasing identified Lebanese and refugee communities as well as insufficient knowledge of hygiene practices in informal tented settlements.





Hygiene kits were distributed to 560 households in Aarsal,
Dalhamiya, Terbol and Marj Bekaa, providing them with hygiene
items which these families could not afford to purchase otherwise.
To also promote healthy hygiene practices for displaced Syrian
families, ADRA organized hygiene awareness sessions in informal
tented settlements. The sessions both adults and children.
The main activity of the project objective was to build a 500 cubic
meter water reservoir provides 26,300 Lebanese host-communities
and Syrian refugees in the Douris village with reliable access to
quality water and Bekaa,

Additionally, distribution of hygiene kits were contributed to increase hygiene standards for the households in informal tented settlements and hygiene awareness sessions for the most vulnerable families to increased hygiene standards.



The WARM III project was designed to alleviate the suffering of Syrian refugees and vulnerable Lebanese, in Baalbek, Lebanon.



A total of 690 households were reached (approximately, 3,450 individuals); who received a fuel card loaded with seventy five USD so that they could purchase fuel for three months.



The fuel was used to provide families with sufficient heating during the winter months.

The project had four components: distribution of mobility aid and assistive devices, distribution of emergency cash, home visits, and capacity building for caregivers.

Older persons are one of the most under assisted populations within humanitarian assistance yet this demographic of people are considered one of the most vulnerable.

Through the APS - VEP project, 265 Lebanese and Syrian refugee elderly persons (182 females, 83 males) above 60 years old were provided with protection assistance.

The project focused on and reducing the feeling of neglect, isolation, and building their resilience. Also, ADRA conducted sessions for caregivers and the community to build their capacity to better respond to the needs of the elderly.







Mobility Aid and Assistive Devices: included wheelchairs, walking frames, and hearing devices.



assistance was used as a humanitarian response tool to reduce protection risks and maintain the dignity of the older person. The cash was to relieve the beneficiary out of abject poverty or a protection risk.



Caregiver Capacity Building: Sessions were carried out to disseminate information on how and where caregivers can receive support and access services for the elderly; to be able to identify protection risks as well as refer the elderly effectively to the appropriate service. Also, to provide a platform for caregivers to share their challenges and receive encouragement in the daily care of the elderly.





Home visitations were conducted by the Community Workers to reduce the feelings of isolation and neglect felt by many of our elderly beneficiaries. During these home visits the Community Workers engaged in conversations sharing stories and memories; demonstrated how to use the mobility aid/assistive devices we distributed; disseminated information on available services and how to access them; and identified the other needs of the older person in case they need to be referred. Finally, our Community Workers would accompany the beneficiary for a walk or run errands which contributed to the feelings of positivity.










